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IN THE CONTRA-FLOW OF HISTORY

PURIKALI WILL INVEST TO STIMULATE THE USE OF BIKES

Purikali – While developing countries are increasing the number of vehicles per capita, Kaupelan goes in the opposite direction. The government of the Party of Liberty-Green (PMR) encourages the use of bicycles and public transportation instead of private vehicles, displeasing businessmen from the automotive sector.

The Legislative Chamber of Purikali approved last week a program proposed by PMR, despite the reluctance of the city mayor, Betsina Tawahutu, from the Development Party (PM). The program, called BBS or Bike-Bus-Subway, intends to reduce the circulation of private vehicles. A capital budget of 150 million huwas was approved for the project. Bicycles will be subsidised for low-income people, since proved their use for transportation.

In addition, subway and bus stations will have free parking lots for bikes and street lanes exclusive for bicycles will be built in the suburban neighbourhoods of Purikali. Thirty new bus routes will be created and 250 new buses will be added to the existing fleet. Currently, of the 700,000 daily trips, 29% are made by subway, 7% by bus, 14% by bus and subway, and 50% by car. Moreover, it is estimated that currently about 50,000 daily trips are made by bicycle. With the new measures, it is expected a growth of 150% on bike trips, reducing car trips. On the other hand, the government of the country is expecting the Parliament to approve the expansion of the subway network, with costs estimated in 1.1 billion huwas, to extend the Yellow Line to the northwest, through the neighbourhood of Kuruwan.

KAUPELAN PROPOSES IMPORT TAX EXEMPTION FOR FICT

Purikali – At 29, the ambassador of Kaupelan to FICT, Wasahi Aramduhun, graduated in international relations by the Royal University of Purikali, with postgraduate studies in economics, joined the diplomatic service just five years ago and is already praised for his bold and innovative attitudes. He is optimistic about the future of FICT and its relevance to the country. "I'm confident the cooperation and trade of the bloc will be beneficial to all the members and Kaupelan can have an important role in this process" he said. "Several proposals have been brought to debate in order to make the organization active and influential in the development of its members."

The Kaupelanese proposal presented so far is the elimination of import taxes for goods produced within the bloc, creating a kind of common market. The proposal was strongly opposed, especially by Dhram Phá and Khusqaikama that saw the initiative as a threat to their local production. Gradually, however, the initiative is gaining sympathy and may be approved at the next Council meeting in 2012. "The initiative will benefit exports of the member states, especially the least developed, enabling competitive advantage over products from major economies such as China or US., and will also increase the cooperation among the members" Aramduhun said. WATERA LAUNCHES A MINI-VEHICLE

Contrary to the policy of the Party of Liberty-Green (PMR) that advocates the increasing use of public transportation and the reduction in the number of private cars on the streets of the country, Watera automaker launches a new vehicle, aimed mainly to export. It is true that the new Jimpy



is a mini-vehicle, cheap and with low fuel consumption, despite the design inspired in its antithesis, the Hummers, those huge, anti-ecological, gas-guzzling vehicles of last decade. The car will be released in three versions; the basic one, gasoline, will focus on emerging markets and will be produced at the Watera plant in Ambon, Indonesia; the top version, also gasoline, will focus on mature markets and will be produced by Watera in Purikali; finally, the more expensive version, with an electric motor, will also be addressed to mature markets and will be produced by the brand Darapali in Bandajaya.

The total production will be of 50,000 units per year. The price of the vehicles in Kaupelan will range from 25,000 huwas (top version, gasoline) to 70,000 huwas (electric version).

According to the CEO, Kawi Taumai, Watera is considering the installation of a plant in Yutyrama, in association with the local Amawá (*Amasō Wykwá* or Amazon Vehicles) for the assembly of 20,000 vehicles aiming the South American and African markets. The deal requires approval from the Yutyraman government, and faces opposition from local environmentalists.

RAINY SEASON

FLOODING IN THE VALLEY OF MAMBAKI LEAVES HUNDREDS HOMELESS

Bandajaya – Cities in the valley of the river Mambaki were hit hard by heavy thunderstorms in recent days. The flooding has wreaked havoc especially in Mambaki, Kurunginu and Kautaira, leaving hundreds homeless. Civil defence recorded four deaths caused by the flooding.

The people of the affected areas were rushed by helicopter to gyms and centres for homeless in Bandajaya. The highway 02, that links the capital to Bandajaya passing through the valley of Mambaki, is partially interrupted, limiting the activities of rescue and humanitarian aid to the region. The government has made appeals to the population asking for donations of water, food and medicine.

The ministry of Social Assistance sent a sum of 200,000 huwas in emergency for the victims.

UMALA SHIPYARD DELIVERS PATROL CRAFT TO ROYAL TARMORYAN NAVY

Umala – The TANWAR shipyard – Tanwahu Raja Umala – specialized in military ships, delivered this month the patrol boat, *Eghlid Horaz*, to the Tarmoryan Navy. The vessel is part of an order for two ships to be delivered to Tarmorya until the end of 2012.

The ship is operated by a crew of ten military. It is primarily intended to patrol the coast and defend the territorial sea of that Mediterranean country.

The Royal Kaupelanese Navy has fifteen ships of that type, the *Jalabara* class, and all of them were produced in the country between 1999 and 2003. The cost of trading was not revealed by the Ministry of Defence, but is estimated by analysts to be about thirty million huwas.
