Covid-19 vaccination at slow pace

Purikali - Cardinal Yose Nuhuroa, Archbishop of Purikali, said on TV during the Good Friday homily: “after the ordeal of this pandemic, may the Resurrection of Christ be a breath of hope and dream to our hearts”. However, vaccination, the biggest hope for controlling this disease, is still proceeding at slow pace in Kaupelan.

The situation of Covid-19 is not too bad in the country, in comparison with neighbours like Indonesia, for example.

Just over 10,700 cases and 73 deaths. But to overcome this health problem and to recover the economy, fast vaccination is a key point.

According to the Ministry of Health, 174,891 persons received the vaccine until yesterday (4.17% of the total population), with the rate of around 2,000 vaccines per day. This rate should increase more than 5 times to vaccinate the whole population in one year.

A timid recovery of the economy

Purikali - Despite still keeping restrictions to many services and almost without foreign visitors, the economy shows the first signs of recovery mostly for the internal market. However, given the importance and dependency of the external market for Kaupelanese economy, there are still huge difficulties for a complete recovery.

The industry increased the production, although exports are still very low.

Watera/Darapali already started the production of the new electric vehicle e-Jimpy – a mini jeep-like 2-seat vehicle – in Bandajaya assembly plant. The low price of less than KAH 40,000 (around USD 15,000) is an asset of the company for sales abroad. The plant in Ambon, Indonesia, did not start yet the production of the low-cost gasoline version of Jimpy due to Covid-19.

The budget airline TriAir, a joint

venture from the three UIEMB countries, with MKA’s 30% shareholding, is operating regional flights within UIEMB.

The most affected sector of the economy is the tourism, and its related activities, like entertainments, which are largely dependent of foreigners, remain in a critical situation. The government is considering accepting tourists from Australia and China, the most important countries for tourism in Kaupelan and where Covid is relatively well controlled. In this case, just a Covid test would be required, without the 14-day quarantine.

An example of success during the pandemic is Daranet, a former internet provider that is currently working on food, supermarket and other goods delivery, taxi service, bike rent, etc., all by an app in the cell phone,
